Women. Africa. Philanthropy



Women on the African continent play critical and diverse roles in philanthropy, however efforts to build narratives, develop knowledge, provide support, and advocate for equitable representation have not fully captured their contributions. There is a noticeable gap in research and initiatives focused specifically on understanding, supporting, and amplifying women's multiple roles in philanthropy.

In response, Adoye, formerly known as Women in African Philanthropy, was launched as a programme within the Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment. **Adoye, which means 'Love in Action' aims to recognise, understand, celebrate, support and amplify the significant roles and impacts of women in all areas of philanthropy across the continent.**

When we refer to “Women in African Philanthropy” we include women who engage in everyday or organic giving of their resources, as well as those who contribute to or through various community, civic, or non-profit organisations. It also includes high-net-worth women who are substantial givers and women professionals who are actively involved in or academically engaged with African philanthropy institutions. In this context, “resources” encompasses a wide range of contributions such as time, skills, expertise, social capital, assets, money, and other forms of giving. Our conception of 'African' is pan-African; as such it is inclusive of the wider African diaspora, though initial attention will be focused on the continent directly. Our constituency is inclusive of women in all their diversities.

Adoye is a programme within the Centre on African Philanthropy and Social Investment (CAPSI), aligning its mission with the Centre's broader goals of promoting effective and impactful philanthropic practices on the continent. This affiliation enhances its ability to leverage resources, networks and expertise, while being positioned to inform thinking within the Centre's other streams.

Our Values

Adoye holds at its core:

- a) The diversity of pan-African philanthropic narratives, histories and practices.
- b) That the multiple expressions of solidarity in philanthropy exceed monetary value.
- c) The importance of centring African agency, perspectives, and lived experience in the process and content of knowledge creation.
- d) The importance of challenging narratives and practices that exist through interconnected and structural systems of privilege, power and patriarchy.
- e) That all voices, perspectives and contributions are equal, irrespective of background, status, affiliation or orientation.
- f) That relationships must be rooted in dignity, respect and solidarity.
- g) The importance of well-being and care as critical operational foundations.
- h) The importance of collective action and collaboration in advancing the work.

Our Story

The seeds for the establishment of Adoye were planted in late 2021 when CAPSI hosted a webinar titled 'Women and Philanthropy – the Feminisation of Philanthropy'. One of the emerging recommendations was the establishment of a network for women involved in different parts of philanthropy. Through consultations with partners and stakeholders, as well as further consideration under a Fellowship at CUNY in 2022, the imperative for this work was deepened.

In 2023, the programme began explorations with a call for women active in the sector across the continent to share reflections to inform the work. The initiative also launched a networking practice through a WhatsApp group. In May 2023, the Centre officially launched what was then known as the Women in African Philanthropy Programme.

Our Work

Adoye is guided by the following goals:

- a) Advance knowledge on the roles and contributions of women in African philanthropy and the practices that underlie these.
- b) Deepen understanding of the challenges faced by women in African philanthropy.
- c) Foster collaboration among diverse stakeholders within the philanthropic community.
- d) Strengthen the work of women in African philanthropy in advancing positive social change and justice-based transformations.
- e) Influence more inclusive policies and practices within, and related to, the philanthropic sector.
- f) Foster innovative research, and knowledge creation and amplify good practice.
- g) Build a network of individuals committed to advancing the agenda of women in African philanthropy.
- h) Strengthen the field of women in African philanthropy.

To advance the goals of the programme, we will prioritise the following strategies:

- a) Building knowledge through academic and action-oriented research that informs practices and contributes to publications, academic and practitioner oriented curriculum development; a senior fellowship programme to support critical reflection, writing and knowledge sharing; and a mentorship programme to nurture emerging leaders in women's philanthropy.
- b) Fostering dialogue through the creation of networking spaces for Adoye to connect and collaborate; convenings to interrogate and deepen particular issues and strengthen the work of women in philanthropy; and facilitate the exchange of ideas and experiences. Adoye will engage in pan-African and global discussions that will help shape the narrative around women in African philanthropy and expand support for its ecosystem.

- c) Cultivating partnerships will be essential to address gaps and advance our work. This includes collaborating with other philanthropic organisations and forming new alliances with groups that advance the work of women in philanthropy.
- d) Advocacy efforts will aim to raise awareness through targeted campaigns and events, influence attitudes, perceptions, and practices by sharing research findings and advocate for supportive policies through evidence-based insights.

Networking Group

During the initial stages, Adoye established a networking group. The idea behind this group was to provide an open space that could facilitate WhatsApp-based networking, and information sharing. To date, the networking group has attracted a diverse range of our targeted constituencies. The group boasts over one hundred members from South Africa, Namibia, Nigeria, Uganda, Tanzania, Eswatini, Kenya, Ghana, Ethiopia, Malawi, Senegal, Zambia and Zimbabwe as well as international members from the USA and Barbados. Currently serving as a space for information sharing, we are exploring how to leverage the space to enrich discussions, perspectives, and collaborative efforts – fostering a truly pan-African and global dialogue on women’s philanthropy.

She founded Eyala, a platform amplifying the voices of African feminists, and played a key role in establishing Girls Not Brides, the global partnership to end child marriage. Françoise's work focuses on supporting African feminist movements and advancing gender policy. She has served on the boards of several organisations, including the Malala Fund and the Equality Fund, and has been recognised as one of the world's 100 Most Influential People in Gender Policy by Apolitical.
